

FIFA World Cup 2014: Football fever grips Cuba

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Once every four years, Cubans leave behind their passion for baseball and surrender themselves to football's charm as FIFA World Cup arrives. Cubans, who are very passionate, openly support the Latin American national teams, especially Brazil and Argentina, though many also follow the Spanish team, reports Xinhua.

The football fever is fed thanks to the live broadcast of the total 64 matches. Four of the most centric and big cinemas in Havana — Yara, Riviera, La Ramba are open to live shows of the World Cup games. Crowds of fans, especially young ones, go cheer their favourite team as if they were in some Brazilian stadium.

Many people also gather to watch the games at cafeterias and restaurants throughout the island.
